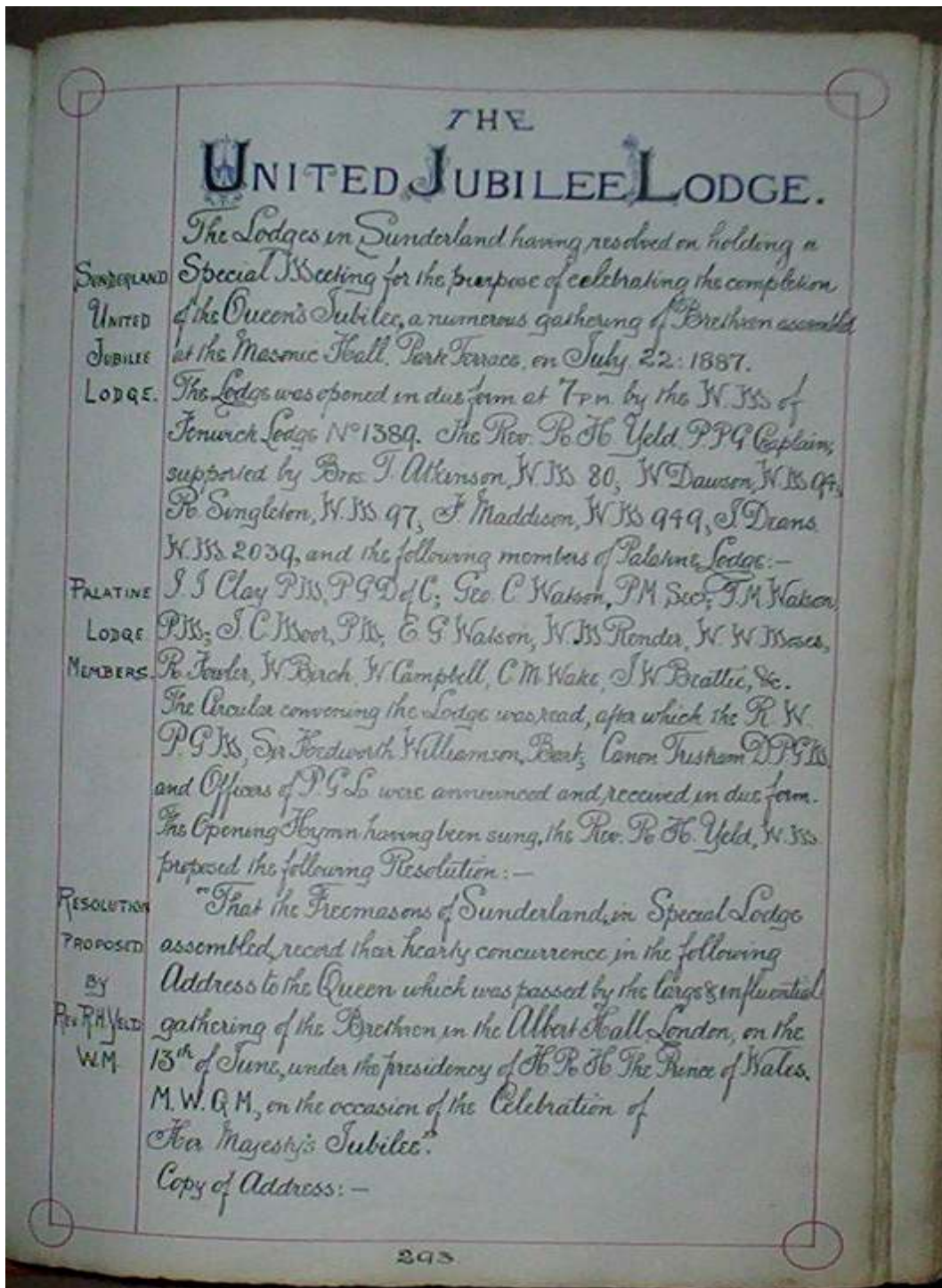
The United Jubilee Lodge

On 22nd July 1887 the lodges of Sunderland gathered in the Masonic Hall, Sunderland for the purpose of celebrating the completion of Queen Victoria's Jubilee.....

Quatuor Coronati Lodge No 2076 decided to hold their summer outing in Durham with Sunderland as their headquarters in July 1908.

The Lodges, Royal Arch Chapters and Mark Lodges of Sunderland decided to make their visit memorable.

To the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty.
We, your Majesty's most loyal and faithful Subjects, the Free Accepted
Masons under the United Grand Lodge of England, most respectfully
desire to approach the Throne on the auspicious occasion of your Majesty
having completed the Fiftieth Year of your Reign over the United
Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, to assure your Majesty
of our fervent and unabated attachment to your Throne and
Royal person.

Founded, as our Ancient Institution is on principles of
unswerving loyalty to our Sovereign and fidelity to our Country;
we rejoice to think that the great increase of our Order in all parts of your
Majesty's dominions is in unison with the welfare of the Nation and
the maintenance of the established Institutions of the land, which it
will ever be our earnest desire to preserve inviolate.

We would humbly express our Gratitude to the Great Architect
of the Universe for having spared your Majesty to Reign over these
Realms for so extended a period, and we do pray that He may
continue to preserve your Majesty to rule with that full sovereignty
which affection can alone ensure the hearts of your faithful subjects,
and more especially of the Fraternity which we today represent.

May the Almighty vouchsafe to your Majesty a long and
happy continuance of your Reign over a loyal and
devoted people.

P. G. M. This Resolution was seconded by the P. G. M., who referred to the loyalty which ever had continued to distinguish the Members of the Craft, and supported by Canon Tristram, D. D. in eloquent terms. On being put to the Lodge, the Resolution was carried unanimously amidst acclamation.

The Lodge, after agreeing, "that as a permanent record of this meeting, the Minutes be entered on the Minute Books of the various Lodges", was closed in due form.

"That the Palatine Lodge N^o 97, duly assembled, hereby desires to record its deep sympathy with His Majesty King Edward VIII, His Majesty Queen Alexandra, and the Royal Family, in the great loss which they and the whole Empire have sustained in the death of Her Most Gracious Majesty, the revered and well beloved Queen Victoria, and hereby pledge our warmest loyalty and devotion to his person and throne, and wish that his Reign may be long and prosperous."

On Friday July 17th the day's programme opened with a visit to St Peter's Parish Church, Monkwearmouth, where they were received by the Rev. D. S. Routflower Vicar, who gave a concise account of this Historic Edifice. It had been arranged to visit the Bede Memorial in Peter Park, but instead, the Party proceeded, via The Ferry, to Freemasons' Hall, Queen Street, where the relics & possessions of Phoenix Lodge, were viewed with considerable interest.

After partaking of Luncheon in the Freemasons' Hall, Old Street, a visit was paid to the historic Castle & Cathedral, where the Norman Gate 1128-1133, the Chapel of the Nine Altars, 1242-1280, the finest example of Early English work, the Neville Monuments, and Tomb of Ven Bede, and other objects of interest, were shown and commented on.

The Reception Room, in which the gathering was held, was tastefully arranged, the room being carpeted and decorated with palms &c.

Bro G. W. Bain, in introducing the Mayor, observed that to say he was not able to say 'My Brother the Mayor', although he had all the virtues of a Freemason. On the Mayor they had 'a Christian man' and when his time of office was up his fellow citizens would say 'that he had nobly done his duty'.

The Mayor of Sunderland (Councillor Walker) expressed his pleasure in welcoming the Freemasons to Sunderland. Since the time when the Ven. Bede in St Peter's Monastery taught the young Nearsider to consider religion to the present time, he thought they had, as a people, very much to be proud of.

In welcoming them to Sunderland he was glad to welcome them to a Town that had a past, and he believed would have a future.

Freemasonry was a Brotherhood in the truest sense of the word, and calculated to do much good. He believed it was a real bond of union, with an ideal - very high, very sacred, loyal, true and manly. He asked them to make the best of their visit to Sunderland and hoped they would enjoy themselves.

In the name of the people of Sunderland he welcomed them into their midst, and although they were a blunt and outspoken people in the North, when they said they were glad to see them they meant it [Applause].
